Greetings Comrades

I understand you would like my comments on the 2016 Poppy Campaign as well as a monthly breakdown on the Poppy Trust expenditures at #340. The monthly balance sheet will be available and read at each of our General Meetings, on the first Tuesday of each month according to our By-laws. We are looking forward to seeing you in attendance for these meetings and commentary.

Although the Poppy Campaign commences the end of October and comes to fruition on November 11, the Poppy Trust Fund is open for business on a year round basis. When Remembrance Day has passed it certainly doesn't mean that the carpet gets rolled up and the doors shut. The needs of ALL Veterans, Veterans Comforts, Air Cadets and allowable expenditures like assisting to disaster relief or the wish lists of our local and regional Hospitals or Hospice care, etc. does not cease. The financial needs and requirements are still coming in all year and becoming more so. The #340 Poppy Trust Fund recognizes zero dollars from Membership dues, bar sales or our special dinners, it comes from the public.

Quoted from the 2016 revision of the Poppy Manual.

"Poppy Funds are made available through the generosity of the Canadian public and are part of the public trust fund between Canadians and the Legion. To safeguard this bond, Poppy Trust Funds must be held in trust at each Branch and Command level of the Legion. They may not be used as, or in place of, general or any other Branch funds."

"In order for the Poppy Campaign to be successful, all Legion members at each level of the organization must cooperate and communicate with each other to the fullest. There is a saying 'a chain is only as strong as its weakest link' - and this holds just as true for the Poppy Campaign as anything else. In short, it is through the cooperative effort of each member that we achieve success."

The Branch #340 Poppy Campaign is an administrative chore handled up until now and strictly by the Poppy Chairman. The #340 Poppy Chair has over the last 4 terms identified a solid Vice Chair role to the campaign and this coming year will be identifying a 'Poppy Committee' to facilitate the administrative demands of our campaign.

COMRADES, by statistics, less than 0.05% of our Royal Canadian Legion Port Elgin Branch #340 Membership assisted with the 2016 Poppy Campaign. A staggering fact is that by stats even less than that recognized a conscious financial donation to the Poppy Trust Fund which aids greatly in our own community.

It was a sworn oath each of us took upon being granted 'membership' to assist with our biggest endeavour of the year, Poppy. It is also, and still is, a sworn oath of duty by each Ladies Auxiliary Member to assist with the Poppy Campaign.

To those of you that honoured your sworn oath of assisting with the Poppy Campaign, I would say 'Thank You, God Bless you and give you a proper General Salute, white gloves and beret included'. You are truly Canadians and salt of the earth respectable people.

MEMBERSHIP

The Royal Canadian Legion is unique in that it is a Canada wide non-profit Veteran's organization founded by Veterans for Veterans. Legion Branches are member oriented with a membership who believe in and promote the perpetuation of "Remembrance" and the welfare of our Veterans.

In 1926, the "Legion" in Canada was born out of a group of 15 Veterans organizations formed after WW1 to promote the welfare of its Veterans. The largest of this group was the "Great War Veterans Association" and the oldest was the "Army and Navy Veterans Association".

Thirteen of these organizations, including the "Great War Veterans Association" joined together to form the "**Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League**". In 1961, the "Act to Incorporate" was amended to change the name of the Canadian Legion to "**The Royal Canadian Legion**". The word "Royal" was conferred by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth in recognition of the Legion's 35 years of dedicated service.

Initially, the Legion was an organization composed entirely of Veterans. These members were ex-service men and women who came from all walks of life possessing the leadership skills and training learned as sailors, soldiers and airmen. As "Comrades-in-Arms" who shared a common background, they were part of a brotherhood who worked together over the years to improve pension benefits and living conditions for our Veterans and their families.

At present, there are **403** Legion Branches in Ontario, **1004** Branches in the rest of Canada, **14** Branches in the USA, **5** Branches in Europe and **1** Branch in Mexico, for a grand total of **1427** Branches. Legion Membership peaked at 602,000 members in 1984 and in **2016** that total now stands at nearly 300,000.

Today, there is no requirement to have a family link to a Veteran in order to become a member of the Royal Canadian Legion. Voting membership in the Legion is now open to any Canadian citizen of Federal voting age who supports the purposes and objects of the Royal Canadian Legion. Non-voting membership is also available to any non-Canadian citizen who is of Federal voting age.

Comrades, the Royal Canadian Legion is the cornerstone for many towns in Ontario. We continue to support our veterans as well as give back to the community. Last year we donated just over \$17,000 to many groups in our community including both of our area hospitals. If you know of people who may be interested in joining please invite them in. All new members will be welcomed.

We invite you to share your story or the story of a loved one through your local Legion Branch.




AIR CADETS
