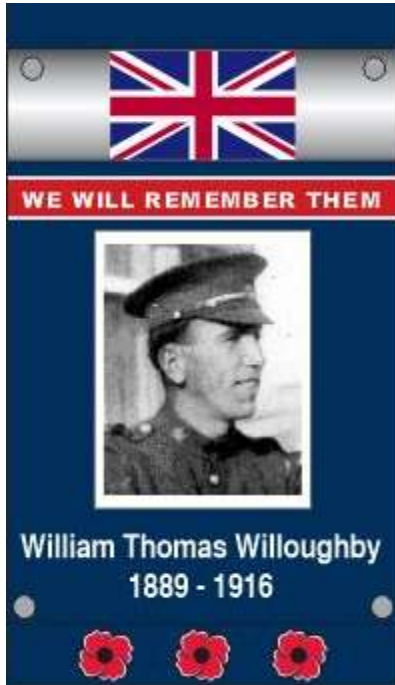

William Thomas Willoughby – His Last Battle



William was born in Port Elgin on July 17, 1889, a son to Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Willoughby. He found his way to Western Canada with his wife Margaret. While working as a Teamster he enlisted in the Canadian Expeditionary Force and signed his attestation papers at Banff Alberta on February 2, 1915.

He became a member of the 50th Battalion (Calgary) Canadian Expeditionary Force. They left Halifax for Britain on the 27th of October in 1915 aboard the S. S. Orduna. The Battalion was under the command of LT. Col. E. G. Mason. Following extensive training in England the Battalion arrived in France on August 11, 1916. The 50th Battalion fought as part of the 10th Canadian Infantry Brigade, 4th Canadian Division, in France and Belgium (Flanders) to the end of the war.

They were ordered to Ancre Heights in October 1916. This was the scene of Canada's first involvement in the Battle of the Somme, which had begun on July 1 and which ultimately resulted in 25,000 Canadian casualties, dead or wounded.

After their arrival, the 50th was ordered into the fight and they suffered heavily. The battle was fierce and continued on into November.

On the night of November 17, 1916 the first snow of the season fell and the attack by the 4th Canadian Division, including the 50th Battalion, begun at 6:10 a.m. with sleet. It later turned to rain with nil visibility. The plan was for them to attack the Desire and Desire Support Trenches south of Grancourt. A new German trench obstructed the eastern flank of the attack, while on the far right a British smoke barrage hampered the brigades advance. Initially meeting minimal resistance, the 50th took more than 100 German prisoners. They had begun to dig in behind the Desire Support Trench before losses from flanking German fire forced them to retreat to the Regina Trench. This ended their actions for November 18th.

It was during this action that the 27-year-old, William Willoughby lost his life. He is buried very close by, in the Adanac Cemetery along with 3,184 British Commonwealth casualties. Of these, there are only 1,476 identified while 1,708 remain unknown. Of those identified most are from Canada and the United Kingdom.

William is one of those identified and is buried in Section II, Row E., Grave 19. Willoughby descendants still reside in Saugeen Shores
May he long be remembered!

THE DAM BUSTERS - REVISITED

One of the most famous air raids of the 2nd World War took place 75 years ago on May 16, 1943. Operation Chastise was executed by a specially chosen and trained squadron of Lancasters. Each aircraft carried one unique bomb that looked like a 45 gallon drum, and spun so that it would bounce like a skipping stone over the surface of the water. The targets were the Ruhr River dams, Mohne, Eder and Sorpe, located in the industrial heartland of Germany. The dams provided hydroelectric power for most of the factories producing much of the war materials for all branches of the axis forces.

It was a military operation that became legendary. The attack marked the first time the allies took the war inside Nazi Germany. The operation had been planned for a long time and many obstacles had to be overcome. For example, the plane had to fly at exactly 60 feet above the water and at a speed of 232 mph, so that the bomb would skip over the water the proper distance, before settling against the dam wall, detonating under water, triggered by a time fuse. It was dangerous work requiring precise low level flying, all the while facing heavy anti-aircraft fire.

In May of this year I attended a wonderful event at the Canadian Warplane Museum (CWM) in Hamilton. Ted Barris, well known Canadian author of war stories, was the guest speaker. His new book, **"The Dam Busters - Canadian Connection"** was being published and about to be released. Nearly 600 people were seated on the hangar floor facing our Canadian Lancaster VR-A as a backdrop. She had been painted in the Dam Busters colours for the occasion as a tribute.

Ted Barris' presentation was masterful. As he spoke, pictures of the airmen, the planes and the dams came up on two large screens. In his research he discovered that nearly one third of the

133 airmen on that raid were trained in Canada under the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan. About 40 Canadians were flying in that elite group. Of the 19 bombers outbound eight did not return and 53 lives were lost.

Barris acknowledged the 14 Canadians who were killed on that raid. There was a section of reserved seating for the families of those lost airmen. They came from all parts of Canada, and as the talk unfolded each family was asked to stand. It was a powerful and emotional time for all of us and one of the finest remembrance events I have ever attended. The relatives appreciated the fact that their loved ones were recognized and honoured for their sacrifice.

I want to get a copy of Ted's book for our Legion Branch in the hope that our Air Force veterans will read it. Anyone interested in war history will appreciate it immensely.

Military Service Recognition Book Program

I am pleased to report to you that our 5th volume of the MSRB will be coming to your Branches between end of Sept. and mid-Oct. This book features 700 veterans photos/bios that the Ontario Command coordinators (M.A. Goheen & Carolyn Mc Caul) have processed between Sept. 2015- June 2017 as well as 230 from the 2017-18 submission year (mostly Comrade Goheen's). It is a total of 500 pages.

Also, Fenety Telemarketing Services from New Brunswick (our publisher of the MSRB) have been contracted by Ontario Command to act on our behalf and conduct a fundraising drive by random telephone marketing throughout Ontario and please advise your members/staff/bartenders and executives that should they or anyone contact the Branch for further info---this is NOT A SCAM but is authorized by Ontario Command. This telephone solicitation has already begun **BUT WILL NOT BE DONE from the beginning of POPPY CAMPAIGN until after Nov. 11th.**

Recently every Branch will have received a package sent by Ontario Command that contains the latest information on this program and the promotional poster we would like you to post on your bulletin boards, a press release, a new 2018 SUBMISSION FORM---this must be signed by the veteran or family member—we have also increased the amount of words for the biography to 200 words MAXIMUM. There is also a special information page for Branch Presidents.

Make sure the 2018 forms are used all others are not accepted. Also this information can be found on the Ontario Command website, www.on.Legion.ca accessed from the home page and as well you can view a website version of previous books as well as Volume 5.

You may say to yourself “why should we support this program?” This program has resulted in a total net profit of \$760,501.55 since we introduced our program in Kingston in 2013. Expenses to date are in the amount of \$132,140.56 with the majority of these expenses (\$101,977.75) being for our Thanks for Wearing Your Poppy brochures. This includes the cost of printing and distribution of these brochures. Other expenses include \$7281.20 for a revitalization meeting of Zone and District people in November of 2014; \$10,342.80 Committee expenses which includes postage and supplies; and \$12,538.81 for the additional pages we included in our Volumes #3 and #4. These funds have been allocated towards various Veterans Transition programs which in turn assist our Veterans who face challenges in their day to day lives.

Once our books are distributed, we continually hear that Branches have difficulty in where they might distribute their supply of books. Schools of course have been mentioned. And a good time to be doing this, is leading up to our Remembrance period when members are visiting schools to see if they would like a Veteran or Legion member attend or assist with their schools Remembrance Ceremony. Or should a Veteran or Legion member be invited to the school to talk to students about Remembrance a book could be presented to the class. There will be schools that refuse due to various school board decisions, but with our books

being all about Remembrance, we should be doing what we can to have at least one of our books into the schools, especially high schools and the higher grades of elementary schools. The schools should also be made aware of the electronic copies that are available on our Command website, since schools, especially our students, are totally engulfed in the electronic world.

Other suggestions include: local libraries, museums, Veterans Residences, Long Term Care Facilities, Medical Clinic Offices, Doctor Offices, Dentist Offices, Town Halls, Law Offices etc., and of course within Branches. We also strongly recommend that Branches with a nearby military base, military organization or a First Nations reserve within their area, pay them a visit and give them an introductory package and a copy(s) of our MSRB. It is also suggested that a copy be given to any Veteran's family who may have had a submission in the book from a Branch. It is also an opportune time to be utilizing them at various displays that may be set up for our annual Poppy Campaign or special events such as PUMPKINFEST.

For year #5 of our program, we received a total of 365 submissions of which 230 are published in Book 5. **Currently we have 135 submissions left from 2017-18 to be published and are in great need of more for next year's book.** ONLY 5 are left to be published from District C. (4 Galt & 1 Hespeler). We would like to have every Branch in the District submit as many as possible; you as the submitting family member or the veteran do not have to be a Legion member---this program is open to all Veterans regardless of Legion membership. All District C Branches submit to Mary Ann Goheen directly --- Do not send to Ontario Command. The total number of submissions received for the first five volumes is 3639. 2743 of those submissions were received in the first two years of our program, and only 824 over the past three years. So, we do need to actively promote our program on an ongoing basis in order to receive more Veteran submissions for our books, and we ask for all of your assistance in this regard.
